DR LWAZI LUSHABA GUEST LECTURE

On Thursday 6 May, Herschel's senior History students attended a guest lecture by Dr Lwazi Lushaba at Herschel, entitled '*Can there be non-racialists in a racist society?*' Over the course of his discussion, Dr Lushaba outlined the historical roots of racism and provided arguments for what he believes are the most practical, possible and ethical relations we can have with one another in a country reckoning with racism and the legacies of a racist past. It was an afternoon well spent; indeed, many are still deep in thought, a full 2 weeks later!

In conversation with the students after the lecture, it was clear that it had been a deeply meaningful experience. The students expressed much appreciation for the opportunity to hear someone speak with great authority and purpose on issues which are complex and multi-faceted. It was unanimous amongst them that they found him a compelling and interesting speaker, who challenged them, and 'really made them think'. Many also said that they simply loved the experience of attending a 'real lecture'.



Dr Lushaba expressed how meaningful it was for him too – in particular, he found the students candour and integrity refreshing, saying that this was because he 'was conversing with minds that were not actively resisting what they were hearing.' (Lindsay Wills)

VOX

Herschel's by-students-for-students social justice and current affairs club, **VOX**, has been busy lately.

Vox is a place for students of all ages to discuss important topics and learn from one another. It prides itself on being a judgement free space and welcoming people regardless of how far along they are on their transformation journey and encourages its members to make and learn from their mistakes.

Recently, sessions have been held on Racism Towards Asians (where we discussed yellow peril, microaggressions, and the current rise in hate crimes towards Asians), how WhatsApp's new privacy policy will affect its users, and a deep dive into Russian history to get a better understanding of its current political tension.

Sessions take the form of discussions with the support of the program *mentimeter*, which is similar to Google Slides, but allows for anonymous audience participation, through polls, multiple-choice and open-ended questions. This has been especially useful in generating dialogue since it can be nerve-wracking to voice your thoughts out loud on delicate issues and there has been a noticeable increase in participation since we began to use it.

When fighting oppression, small steps have to be taken first, through challenging ideologies and shining a light on topics that are rarely discussed, and by having and continuing to have these thought-provoking and complex discussions, Vox is doing exactly that. (Grace North, Grade 11)


