Dear Parents and pupils

Today is Human Rights Day, and as I write this I am aware of how incongruous it is in relation to other public holidays, in that unlike Heritage Day, for example, which provides an opportunity for everyone to celebrate who they are and where they come from; Human Rights Day is a sombre day, especially since we live in a country where so many basic human rights are denied. In assembly last week, I referred to this, in addressing pupils and staff. Not only does the 21 March commemorate the establishment of the South African Human Rights Council (SAHRC), but it is also grounded in the Sharpeville Massacre in which people lost their lives standing up against the Apartheid government, actioning change despite the odds against them in terms of violent recourse. We need to applaud their courage and conviction as we commemorate this dark day in our country's history. Were it not for such action, and for the courage of those who fought for freedom, we would not live in a democratic country.

Despite the many challenges facing South Africa; systemic inequity, poverty, unemployment, gender-based violence, poor service delivery and load shedding (to name but a few), the constitution upholds fundamental human rights that reflect the value placed on respect, dignity and equality. It is important to acknowledge the noble ideals embodied in the South African Constitution even if, as a country, we are a long way off from attaining these rights for all South Africans.

Our single most important challenge is to help establish a social order in which the freedom of the individual will truly mean the freedom of the individual. We must construct that people-centred society of freedom in such a manner that it guarantees the political liberties and the human rights of all our citizens. (Nelson Mandela - Wits Justice Project).

Privilege is not in and of itself bad; what matters is what we do with privilege. (Bell Hooks)

Recently, some experiences within the school environment brought about some reflection on the issue of privilege - what is privilege and how does it impact our school environment – as well as on power dynamics, and how the failure to consider power dynamics in situations that require conversation often results in bullying and micro-aggressions, exclusionary tactics, implicit biases and blind spots, breaking down communication as opposed to enabling effective engagement. Kevin Leathem makes white privilege a very tangible concept within the context of our society: For me privilege is simply a preference for whiteness that saturates our society. I quess if you are white, it's sometimes hard to see the privilege because you're in it and it's all you've ever known. It's like asking a fish to notice water. (Kevin is the Deputy Head at Jeppe in Gauteng. He wrote an extended article published in The Sunday Times on 16 June 2019). I include this because we all need to be conscious of this privilege and to understand how it impacts the way in which we interact with one another.

Ijeoma Oluo is an American writer, whose sentiment having regard to **intention** is on point: In her book, So You Want To Talk About Race, she says: You have to get over the fear of facing the worst in yourself. You should instead fear unexamined racism. Fear the thought that right now, you could be contributing to the oppression of others and you don't know it. But do not fear those who bring that oppression to light. Do not fear the opportunity to do better.

Do not fear the opportunity to do better. I reflect on this line each time I read it and I am not sure exactly what it is about the line that I find so compelling, but it is a line that motivates me to keep working and to do better. Each of us has the opportunity to do better. It has to be taken on board; no amount of intervention by way of workshops, courses, seminars and so on, will evoke consciousness in an individual or organisation if there is not a genuine desire to engage, reflect, read, learn and grow towards doing better.

Being defensive, or even worse, ignorant about privilege and power dynamics does not allow one to enter into a conversation in a genuinely empathetic and receptive manner. It does not make space for people or take into consideration context. More often than not, people who enter conversations unaware of their privilege or of the power that they hold, end up bullying people, offending people and not even being aware of this because they have always held a position of privilege and with that, social power. Their blind spots, implicit biases and need to resolve a situation to their liking means that in such situations they will listen to respond, rather than to understand, and they will employ threats, posturing and bullying tactics entrenching their power and reinforcing their privilege, making it very difficult for a person to meet them at the point where an equally weighted conversation is possible.

We need to be conscious of our social and moral responsibility to respect, engage and accept people as equals, deserving of the dignity, equality and respect that our constitution advocates for all and mindful of

our capacity to represent those who do not always have the power to represent themselves in a society that has such systemic injustices. By being conscious of privilege and aware of the power dynamics in situations, we will facilitate greater equality and ensure that not only do all people have a seat at the table, but that all people are able to participate in the conversations around the table.

OISESA – Term Two

We have started an OISESA (Office of Independent Evaluations Southern Africa) assurance evaluation which will involve stakeholders at Herschel. OISESA began operating in May 2022 to re-establish the process of quality assurance in ISASA schools, following the rather disruptive period of the pandemic. ISASA's vision, "Boldly leading the independent school sector in its pursuit to provide quality education" holds its member schools to high standards and requires them to undertake a whole school self-study/reflection every six years. There is always room for improvement and this process promotes strategic thinking and encourages adaptability.

This is vital in a rapidly changing educational landscape: "Working through a process of critical reflection and self-evaluation enables schools to affirm and celebrate their strengths and identify areas of vulnerability. Participation in the process also demonstrates the school's willingness to be held professionally accountable and enhances the school's credibility with its stakeholders and the wider community."

Part of the process involves the collection of evidence which requires feedback via surveys and I would ask that you please respond to the parent surveys in earnest, as the more feedback we receive the more valuable and meaningful the process will be. The surveys will be distributed next term to allow us to collate the feedback and to form focus groups for further discussion. Three OISESA mentors (one for each phase of the school) will then visit Herschel in July (upon return to school in Term Three) for a verification visit and to assess the efficacy of our process. A final OISESA Quality Assurance Self-Study Report will be written for their review, after which they will produce their own report to complete the process.








SOUTH AFRICAN COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL
