His parents then give him the family history about his shoes and he becomes really proud of his history and wears them to school and explains to the children where they come from.




This week we read **Helping Hands by Ariela Reihill.** The story talks about ways we can help each other by using our hands and that there are various people who help us.




Grade 6 Bullying Protest

CHANGE TO 4MM NEEDLE AND KNIT 30 ROWS IN STOCKING STITCH OR PATTERN OF YOUR CHOICE.

K3 K2 TOG, REPEAT TO END K1

PURL

K2, K2TOG; REPEAT TO END K1

PURL

K1, K2 TOG, REPEAT TO END K1 THREAD ONTO NEEDLE, PULL UP, KNOT AND SEW.
