

Vikki Quarmby Hawkins, a member of our Prep Sports Department since November 2022 bids us farewell


Her expertise in **swimming coaching** and her role as **Head of Water polo** showcased her **dedication**.

who rose above her station in life

and went on to detect many new nebulae in the night sky and became the first woman to discover a comet.

She discovered eight comets in total and won many awards for her contribution to astronomy.

It was her nephew, Sir John Herschel, who travelled to South Africa to explore the night skies of the Southern Hemisphere. Sir John Herschel bought the farm called 'Feldhausen' where

our school, Herschel, now stands.



We were then introduced to Lèa Weimann, who was the 2022 recipient of the Caroline Herschel Award. This award recognises and celebrates the valued and lasting contributions of Herschel alumni in making a significant difference in a community. Miss Weimann received the award for her contribution to climate change and her eco-activism.

In that moment, the spirit of the season was truly alive, fostering a collective sense of joy, reflection, and unity among those gathered to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

















MATRIC RESULTS

THE 2023 RESULTS ARE AWE-INSPIRING AND EXCELLENT

HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDE:

- Of the Class of 2023, which wrote the NSC examinations, 100% PASSED and they achieved a 100% BACHELOR DEGREE PASS.
- The 95 CANDIDATES achieved 388 SUBJECT DISTINCTIONS (including Further Studies Mathematics (Standard) and Further Studies English). THIS EQUATES TO AN AVERAGE OF 4,1 SUBJECT DISTINCTIONS PER CANDIDATE.
- **♦ 15 PUPILS** attained an **AGGREGATE OVER 90%**. (16%) *

WINTER DINNER




THE PROCESS:


This year, the theme of the plays was "Netflix Originals".







OVERVIEW By Mrs Sandy Rule

We have a thriving department with passionate teachers: Sandy Rule, Yaasien Kerbelker, Silvana Scarola, Karen van der Merwe and laboratory assistant, Luyanda Centani. Our students have explored many facets of the subject, learnt vital skills, been on inspiring outings and enjoyed practical experiences.



Our year introduces these students to biological drawing skills, use of a light microscope, the cell, photosynthesis, cellular respiration, gaseous exchange and reproduction. They have developed practical skills and learnt to analyse information.

A highlight was visiting the Two Oceans Aquarium where organisms were closely experienced, and the exhibits were enjoyed.



We are mindful that some students will continue with this wonderful subject and some will not. The course is designed to equip students with important life skills and to build on those important scientific skills that will be further developed in the senior phase. In Grade 9 we have explored water in living organisms, the transport and support systems in humans.



This is an exciting year as it's the start of the FET phase. The subject becomes 'meaty' as important foundations are set. Students get to grips with the four themes: environmental studies, biodiversity, life processes in plants and animals, and life at the molecular level. One of the highlights was our annual visit to the rocky shores at Kommetjie where we did authentic field work, collecting quantitative data to analyse.



Students in Grade 11 are in full academic mode as they prepare for the final assessment at the end of 2024. On the SFD, they practised their scientific essay writing skills after attending a short talk on the topic from Ms East. Another highlight was two of our students, Erin and Cate, winning Gold at EXPO for their experiment on Malaria.



The Grade 12 Life Sciences curriculum is packed with a variety of exciting topics:
Introducing genetics
Inheritance and reproduction
Developments in biotechnology
Understanding evolution

The Grade 12 year is filled with many assessments and practicals. A particularly fun activity is creating our genetics babies using a gene pool of heterozygous characteristics:
we call them our "Reebob Babies".






WHAT DID YOU ENJOY ABOUT YOUR MATHS SFD THIS YEAR?






OVERVIEW by Rachel Howie
